LETTER OF UNDERSTANDING FOR ACADEMIC PARTNERS

The Community Ethics Network welcomes proposals for co-working initiatives with Academic Partners¹. As an Academic Partner of the Community Ethics Network [hereby known as "the Network"], you agree to support and adhere to the following Network expectations (as applicable to individual or institutional Partners):

- To lead or contribute to the identification, design, development and/or implementation of educational, academic and/or research initiative(s) as agreed with the Network which may also include application for grants, submission of abstracts, presentations at conferences, and other special projects;
- To agree to a timeline for the initiative, which will also determine the period of the Academic Partnership's duration;
- To confirm any administrative or resource commitments in a separate document;
- To attend Steering Committee/Working Group meetings as determined necessary and appropriate for the initiative(s);
- To provide the Steering Committee with written notice of any change to academic affiliation;
- To agree with and support the *Code of Ethics for the Community Health and Support Sector*.
- To agree with the terms stated in the Network's *Terms of Reference*.
- To comply with additional terms of partnership as may be required by the Network Steering Committee and agreed with you.

1. A letter of intent that explicitly expresses your interest in partnering with the Network and the proposed initiative(s);
2. A copy of your CV (if individual) or brief profile (if institution or similar);
3. A signed copy of this Letter of Understanding for Academic Partners.
